

# PAYDAY SUPER

The new laws mark one of the biggest changes to our super system in decades and is a big win for workers and their super balances.

## What's changing for workers?

- From 1 July 2026, super must be paid at the same time wages are paid.
- For example, if you are paid fortnightly, your super must be paid fortnightly.

## Why is this good news for Media Super members?

- You receive what you've earned in super every pay cycle.
- Payday Super will strengthen retirement outcomes – earlier payments mean more time your money is invested, helping your super grow faster through compounding.
- Payday Super reduces the risk of your super being lost or unpaid – it's especially positive for lower income earners, women and casual workers, who have been more affected by unpaid super.
- More frequent payments help protect your insurance – because when contributions stop for long periods, insurance can lapse. Payday Super strengthens compliance, so members aren't left without cover when they need it.

## Is there anything workers need to do?

- Short answer, nothing!
- Payday Super laws change employer requirements on frequency of super payments – workers aren't required to do anything.
- It's important to be vigilant when it comes to your retirement savings – regularly check your account and payslips to ensure the correct amounts of super are being paid and have landed in your account.
- Because the frequency of payment in your account will increase, workers can see their super payments more easily through their account.

## What if I'm a sole trader or freelancer?

- If you're self-employed, you're generally responsible for your own super contributions.
- There's no minimum amount, but it's a good idea to put aside around 12% of your income – the same as an employee would receive.

## What can I do if my super hasn't been paid?

## How is the new law enforced?

- The Australian Tax Office is overseeing the change. Employers who miss, underpay or make late super contributions after 1 July 2026 will face new penalties and charges, including the new Superannuation Guarantee Charge.
